

Our work focuses on both immediate aid as well as long-term development including livelihood support, improved access to clean drinking water, orphan care, education, and healthcare. In 2024, IRUSA donors helped support people in Africa through projects like orphan family support in Ethiopia; an emergency water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH)

CHILDREN IN NEED

OUR WORK ACROSS AFRICA

Over 50 million children in Africa have lost one or both parents. Some factors that contribute to the high number of orphans in Africa are poverty, HIV/ AIDs, conflict, drought, and economic hardship.

There is a clear orphan crisis in Africa that IRUSA is working to address through programs that support orphan families today and help them to earn a living tomorrow.

Sharmake's Story





Sharmake lives in a village in Somalia with his mother and six siblings. His father died a few years ago so he is considered an orphan.

After his father's death, Sharmake left school to support his family by farming on their land. But, due to a number of issues, including a lack of funds to acquire agricultural tools and seeds,

no irrigation system, and non-functioning water sources, the family was unable to yield a sufficient amount of agricultural output. Fortunately, Sharmake's family was selected to benefit from a new IRUSA program in the region to support farmers.

Because of your donations, the family was supplied with a drip irrigation system to enhance agricultural output, rehabilitation of a shallow well on their property, and installation of a solar system (as opposed to a generator needing fuel), to improve water accessibility for farming. They also received vegetable seeds including sweet peppers, hot peppers, sweet melon, watermelon, and corn to enhance cash crop products and improve their income.

Sharmake stated that the farm's output has quadrupled as a result of the available solar energy, modern irrigation system, and provided seeds.

Our farm products have generated a significant amount of income, which has changed our standard of living over the last four months."



WATER, SANITATION, & HYGIENE (WASH)

One in three people in Africa face water scarcity, and that number is expected to grow. Access to safe and clean water sources in Africa is worsening due to climate change, urbanization, and population growth. IRUSA is focused on improving WASH access by the construction and rehabilitation of latrines, wells, and water access points for farmers.

Siyat's Story





Siyat is a goat farmer who lives in Garissa County in Kenya. His livestock enabled him to earn a living until he was unable to feed his goats because of drought in the region, a product of climate change.

We tried migrating the animals to different regions, but the drought was widespread. Providing for my family became a daily struggle. We had fewer meals as animals succumbed to the harsh conditions, and food prices in the market went up. Twenty-two of my goats succumbed to the drought, and I had to sell the remaining nine goats at a throwaway price because they were too weak to survive."

IRUSA launched a program in Kenya to help communities adapt to climate change. The program has led to the construction of five boreholes and three dams to increase access to clean water. Farmers also received drought-resistant seeds, tools, and training to strengthen their capacity in agricultural practices, enhancing agricultural and livestock productivity, and to improve socio-economic resilience.

Siyat and 239 other livestock farmers were equipped with a diverse array of farming skills,

agronomic practices, and climate-smart technologies. The training enabled them to transition from solely relying on raising livestock to embracing agriculture as a viable alternative for sustenance and income generation.

"The skills learned have been invaluable. I used my proceeds from selling the weak goats and purchased about two acres of land. I now use the skills learned to plant corn, beans, watermelons, tomatoes, and bananas. I intend to supplement livestock farming with agricultural farming to expand my livelihood sources," Siyat recounts, highlighting the tangible impact of the training on his life and community.

LIVELIHOOD

Africa has the highest extreme poverty rates globally. Around 429 million people on the continent are living below the extreme poverty line of \$2.15 a day. With a population of approximately 1.4 billion inhabitants, roughly one-third of Africa's population lives in extreme poverty. IRUSA is working to implement programs that focus on skills development that can support livelihood and income-generation efforts for a lifetime.

Abdiaziz's Story



Abdiaziz, a livestock farmer from Sabena, has 17 children, and his 61-livestock herd represents not just his wealth but survival. "I have to take care of my animals to sustain my family's source of income," he shared.

Thanks to IRUSA donors, three cattle crushes were constructed in the region. A cattle crush is a strongly built stall or cage that holds big and heavy animals like cattle so that workers can work with them. The cattle crushes promise efficient and effective livestock handling, disease control, and management.

Abdiaziz and other livestock farmers no longer need

to grapple with makeshift solutions like thorn fences to restrain their animals for vaccination. Instead, the facilities provide a safe and controlled environment for livestock health interventions, playing a pivotal role in mitigating livestock morbidity during these challenging times.

The impact of this initiative reverberates across Garissa County. During a recent livestock health campaign organized by the Garissa County Livestock Department, approximately 8,000 animals belonging to 200 livestock keepers were vaccinated at one of the program's cattle crushes in Gurufa. This marked a significant milestone in bolstering the health and resilience of the local livestock population.

EMERGENCIES

When an emergency takes place in an African nation, it is most often either a public health emergency triggered by climate change or a conflict-related disaster. The ongoing conflict in Sudan has forced 12 million people to flee their homes.

IRUSA is working in Sudan to support those who have been displaced, as well as in neighboring countries affected by the conflict.

So far, we have provided food assistance to 327,991 people; cash assistance to 36,230 people; health and nutrition services to 46,225 people; medicines, fuel for generators, and for patients to 20,851 people; agricultural seeds to 100,000 farmers; water storage kits to 4,890 people; hygiene training and soap to 7,663 people; hygiene kits to 3,369 people; non-food items to 1,387 people; shelter assistance to 2,425 people; dignity kits to 4,174 people; recreational items for 1,375 children, women, and girls; and psychosocial support for 2,552 people.



EMERGENCY RELIEF FOR SUDANESE REFUGEES IN CHAD

🧡 Chad

Ongoing clashes between armed groups have been driving mass displacement in Sudan, and millions of refugee returnees have fled Sudan, with many seeking protections in Chad. Women and children represent some 90% of those seeking protection in Chad, with 77% of women arriving in the country alone with children. National agencies anticipate that these figures will rise to over 2.7 million displaced outside Sudan in 2024, with Chad expected to see some of the highest figures of refugees.

IRUSA is improving access to safe, livable conditions for 27,915 new Sudanese refugees (5,583 families) in Chad. IRUSA will support approximately half of the refugee populations at a site in the Ouaddai province and a site in the Sila province. Interventions will include:

- Distribution of care relief kits to 2,957 families (14,785 individuals) consisting of a solar lamp, sleeping mats, mattresses, mosquito nets, a kitchen set, jerrycans, soap, and other household items.
- Access to improved shelter conditions and individual shelters for 2,626 families (13,120 individuals).

OUR WORK ACROSS THE UNITED STATES

Racial inequity and systemic racism, homelessness, divisive politics, poverty, the effects of climate change - just a few issues Americans (and people around the world) face on a daily basis. And now, food and gas prices continue to soar, exacerbating an already difficult circumstance for families across the country: More than 37 million Americans live in poverty - that's nearly 12% of the population of one of "the richest countries in the world." And 65% of those are working but cannot break the cycle of poverty that chains them.

Islam teaches us that charity starts at home, and that's why IRUSA has been dedicated to supporting humanitarian programs for our neighbors in need. In 2024, IRUSA donors helped support nearly 80 projects across 17 states and the District of Columbia, in areas like food security, community development, healthcare, and refugee resettlement.

FOOD SECURITY

Around 37 million Americans suffer from food insecurity - the same as those who are living in poverty. But it is astounding that the US, considered a world superpower, has not solved the food crisis for its own citizens. Rising food prices, climate-affected harvests, reductions in some federal and local government food support for low-income families, food deserts across urban and rural neighborhoods: These are some just some of the reasons so many Americans do not have proper access to foods, let alone healthy foods.

IRUSA'S LARGEST PROGRAM IS FOOD AID,

and, through the support of generous donors, it works year-round to bring food to families in need right here in the US. By the time of this writing in 2024, nearly 200,000 people had received food aid through IRUSA programming including Ramadan food box distributions Qurbani/Udhiyah halal meat

provisions; its portion of the USDA Summer Food effort for low-income children; supported food pantries; and hot meals distributed during Ramadan.



That program - Hot Meals - is a staple of IRUSA's US food aid efforts, and has taken place across several states with the support of many community partners since its inception in 2021, to help alleviate food insecurity in urban areas. This year, the program took its focus to Detroit, MI, where IRUSA worked with the Islamic Center of Detroit (ICD) to provide 1,500 meals each week to lowincome neighbors and to those suffering from homelessness. During Ramadan 2024, the program swelled for a special campaign throughout New York, where five partners across five boroughs distributed hot meals to those in need.


Through IRUSA's support, ICD also runs an ongoing food pantry, where those in need can come weekly to pick out their own food items and pantry staples.



One person who received support through the pantry told us:

Attending the weekly ICD food pantry was a turning point for me and my family. As a single parent struggling to make ends meet, putting food on the table was a constant source of stress. But thanks to the generosity of the volunteers and donors, I no longer have to worry about where our next meal will come from."

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT



youth interested in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) to safety support for survivors of domestic violence.

The Texas Muslim Women's Foundation is one of the organizations IRUSA supports in its mission to help families affected by domestic violence. Chief Executive Officer, Mona Kafee says the IRUSA grant "...has greatly benefited our community by markedly improving our ability to deliver essential services, providing services to families experiencing domestic abuse and support to the most vulnerable families. It allows us to broaden our outreach programs, upgrade infrastructure, and provide additional resources to those

in need. This support enhances community engagement and resilience, particularly empowering women and their families to prosper. Ultimately, the grant bolsters our collective strength to tackle challenges and foster a more vibrant, interconnected community." She adds,

[IRUSA's mission] is centered on supporting women and their families, recognizing that empowering women is crucial to building resilient communities. Through these investments, IRUSA aims to create lasting positive change and contribute to a world where poverty is no longer a barrier to opportunity."

MUSLIM WOMEN



HEALTHCARE

Nearly 26 million Americans are without health insurance, and the majority of them do not have access to adequate healthcare. Even those with health insurance can suffer from an inability to get proper health support and coverage.

IRUSA works with community groups to provide affordable – and often FREE – health screenings and services to low-income families and for those living in homelessness.

In 2024, more than 30,000 Americans across 13 states were served through IRUSA-supported health clinic programming.

One of these programs is through Muslim American Social Services [MASS] in Jacksonville, FL, which aims to provide free social and medical services to anyone

in need, and whose mission it is to create health equity by providing continuity of care to the underserved community in its region. Executive Director, Faisal Sayed, says: "[Our]... collaboration with IRUSA is instrumental in advancing our mission to provide health and social services to underserved populations in northeast Florida. It enhances our capacity to deliver vital services, empowers individuals, and fosters a stronger, more resilient community. We are deeply grateful for this collaboration and remain committed to maximizing its impact for the benefit of those we serve."

Health screenings and consultations are also often part of IRUSA's Day of Dignity events, which take place each summer and fall. In 2024, 25 events brought access to services like these health screenings to neighbors in need across the country, as well as food aid and nutritious hot meals.

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT

There are more than 100,000 refugees who have been resettled in the US in 2024, the same year IRUSA entered its second year of working to help resettle incoming refugee families in partnership with the International Rescue Committee.

Through this essential program, refugees arriving into the country receive support within their new communities, including:

Islamic Relief USA, through six grantee community organizations, is helping nearly 1,052 refugees in 2024 across four states with services like these and more.

One of these organizations is Rohingya Cultural Center (RCC) in Chicago, IL, which provides services like case management, health support, language



support, citizenship classes, academic support, and more for Rohingya refugees resettling in the area. Assistant Director, Sarah Pajeau notes, "the Rohingya refugee community often slips through the cracks due to unique barriers and vulnerabilities ... IRUSA's support has allowed us to continue our very important and much-needed work.



IRUSA understands the challenges our Rohingya community faces, [and] recognizes the importance of RCC employing Rohingya to support Rohingya, which ensures language accessibility, cultural understanding/ competency, and traumainformed care."



MOHAMMAD'S STORY

♀ Florida

Mohammad is a Syrian refugee that arrived in Florida from the Al-Azrag refugee camp in Jordan, in early 2024. Living in the Al-Azrag refugee camp was hard for Mohammad, his wife, and their five children. They had little food, little work, and their children had no access to education in the camp.

When Mohammad and his family arrived, IRUSA welcomed them at the airport and took them to their home that was fully furnished.

"We entered the home, and right when we entered the home it was perfect. We felt so happy. We saw a Qur'an and prayer rug. We felt really at peace and were really happy."

Thanks to donors like you, Mohammad now has a car, a job, and his children are all registered in school.

There is nothing better than what was provided for us. My dream is security, and my kids. My biggest dream is for my kids to study for higher degrees and to become something."

In addition to sustainable programming, IRUSA works quickly to provide urgent and immediate aid and support to survivors of emergencies. Here are some of the recent emergency interventions IRUSA's Disaster Management Team (DMT) and Blueshirt volunteers have responded to.

HURRICANE BERYL EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Hurricane Beryl made landfall in Texas as a Category 1 storm in July, dumping heavy rain and causing destruction in its path. Unfortunately, at least three people were killed. Immediately following the storm, nearly three million people were without power, with only about half having their power restored. IRUSA mobilized staff and volunteers to help provide families in need with food, water, and emergency flood buckets.



PUERTO RICO PREPAREDNESS BACK-TO-SCHOOL PROGRAM

As part of its long-term recovery efforts, IRUSA's DMT staff and volunteers returned to Anasco, Puerto Rico, in June to support hurricane survivors with its annual backpack and hot meals distribution. More than 500 backpacks and hot meals were provided, alongside 500 flood buckets and flood clean-up supplies to help families prepare for the 2024 hurricane season.



HOUSTON STORM RESPONSE

After severe storms ripped through the Houston, TX, area in May, IRUSA's DMT staff and volunteers, working with the American Red Cross, moved quickly to conduct disaster assessments for hundreds of affected families. The assessments are an essential first step in the response and recovery process as they help survivors receive the aid that they need.





From March through July in 2024, IRUSA's DMT supported a build-out of a 3,000 gallon-water storage tank to support the communities of Utuado, Puerto Rico, who are still recovering from 2017's Hurricane Maria. The storage tank ensures quick, easy, and regular access to clean water in case another disaster impacts infrastructure. IRUSA donors had already supported the construction of a water well in the community after the storm, as many of the families were left without clean water access and electricity for more than a year.



PUERTO RICO FLOOD SHELVES BUILD OUT

In April, IRUSA's DMT staff and volunteers helped build flood shelves for low-income families in Barrio Playa in Anasco, Puerto Rico. The shelves are designed to elevate personal property in homes that have been impacted by floods or at-risk of impact. This helps locals protect personal items in case of future floods, and, in turn, help them recover more quickly after a disaster.



HURRICANE HELENE AND HURRICANE MILTON RESPONSE

On September 26, Hurricane Helene made landfall on Florida's Gulf Coast. The Category 4 hurricane, with wind speeds of 140 mph, left a path of destruction over 500 miles long. Shortly after on October 9, Hurricane Milton made landfall on Florida's Gulf Coast as a Category 3 storm, further exacerbating the situation in the area. IRUSA launched an emergency response to provide support and relief to individuals, and our DMT was involved in the assessment process at the national level through FEMA.



COLOMBIA FLOODS EMERGENCY RESPONSE

In early November, Colombia declared a State of Emergency amid torrential rains and extreme weather. The rains have caused widespread flooding, landslides, and infrastructure damage in the country due which has displaced more than 90,000 people. IRUSA's DMT conducted a needs assessment delivered life-saving food aid.

Islamic Relief USA is dedicated to helping those in Asia, and is working tirelessly to address issues such as food insecurity, climate change, education, and more. In 2024 alone, IRUSA helped more than 1.5 million people in Asia, across Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Indonesia, Nepal, Pakistan, the Philippines, and Sri Lanka.

Take a look at some of our work in Asia and read accounts from people you've helped serve across the region.

EDUCATION

More than 75% of the world's 781 million illiterate adults are found in South Asia and Sub-Saharan Africa. Nearly 26% of South Asians are illiterate, and a lot of that is due to cultural barriers that prevent girls from going to school. While girls across Afghanistan have limited access to education under the current leadership, IRUSA supports a Community-Based Education (CBE) program, an educational approach designed for children who are unable to attend formal schools.



Hajira is an 18-year-old who was never able to attend school, something she always dreamed of. Even after her family moved out of Taliban controlled areas, her brother did not give her permission to go to school. As the only unmarried

female, she needed to stay home to take care of their sick mother.

I totally lost myself and [had] a fully broken heart with the current situation."



IRUSA was able to convince Hajira's brother to let her attend IRUSA's education program. "I [am] deeply thankful and appreciative [of] my teacher and IRUSA for providing such opportunities to internally displaced persons, vulnerable families, orphans, and refugees to study and enroll in schools for further education."

Now, Hajira is enrolled in school and dreams of furthering her education. "It's one of my life goals to become a doctor and to treat sick people.
[I] even [hope to] become an employee of this organization [and] to take part in real services [for] vulnerable people and [help] them [have] a prosperous future, insha'Allah."

CLIMATE RESILIENCE

South Asia is one of the most vulnerable regions to climate change, and faces rising sea levels, heat waves, floods, droughts, and increasingly intense and unpredictable weather events. Around 750 million people have been affected by at least one natural disaster in the region, yet countries like Pakistan are only responsible for less than 1% of the global emissions that are causing climate change.

Abdul Hameed's Story

Pakistan



Working on an agricultural farm, Abdul Hameed felt hopeless due to the little money he earns to support his wife and five children. He possessed the knowledge and land to practice tunnel farming - a method of growing crops in semi-closed, greenhouse-like structures – but due to the lack of money and resources, he could not start.

Islamic Relief USA, through our Action For Drought Adaptive Practices and Transformation [ADAPT] program, provided a green tunnel to Abdul Hameed so he can maintain his own drought resistant

For me, this project changed my life because it helped me to utilize such a tunnel that I was waiting for. Thanks to this support I have achieved my goals and it will mark the beginning of a new positive chapter in my life. I am thankful to IRUSA and donors for this magnificent support and aid. I pray that this process of mobilization and endless support will continue."

LIVELIHOOD

The main source of employment in South Asia is agriculture, and in countries like Nepal, more than 80% of the population live in rural areas and depend on farming for their livelihood. With the region experiencing harsh weather conditions, many are struggling to survive off their land.

Laxmi's Story

Nepal

Trying to support her husband and three children, Laxmi found herself working on a farm to earn a living wage. Unfortunately, she was having trouble due to the harsh conditions on the land.

Thanks to IRUSA, Laxmi received training in climate-adapted farming, which helped her tremendously. She also received climate-adapted rice seeds, spray tanks, plastic drums, vegetable seeds, vitamins, and fertilizers.

Now, Laxmi is leading a group of 30 farmers, and regularly organizes monthly meetings to help her team. Her story reflects the positive impact of the project turning challenges into opportunities for livelihood improvement.

EMERGENCY RELIEF FOR FLOOD VICTIMS IN BANGLADESH AND AFGHANISTAN

💡 Bangladesh



Torrential monsoon rains that began in early August triggered widespread flooding across several districts in northern and northeastern regions of Bangladesh. The flash floods affected 5.7 million people, leaving 1.2 million people displaced, numerous villages submerged, and critical infrastructure damaged. The damage also included the death of 39,000 cattle livestock, death of 2.1 million poultry, and 785,000 acres of land flooded.



IRUSA responded immediately by providing essential food supplies to 5,000 of the most vulnerable families. In addition, IRUSA also provided fodder for livestock, Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA), and hygiene kits.

? Afghanistan



On Sunday, May 10, flash floods caused by heavy rains devastated villages in northern Afghanistan, killing 315 people and injuring more than 1,600. Over 21,000 people (3,000 families) were affected, and thousands of homes were destroyed or damaged. Roads and agricultural land were also destroyed by the floods, which struck after days of torrential rain.

IRUSA responded by distributing MPCA, food items, and non-food items to the most vulnerable flood-affected people.

OUR WORK ACROSS EUROPE IRUSA has been in Europe since 1993, when we provided vital emergency aid such as food, water, and shelter in Bosnia. Now, more than 30 years later, IRUSA is dedicated to addressing issues such as food insecurity, shelter, and health across Albania, Bosnia, Greece, Kosovo, and North Macedonia. Take a look at some of our work in Europe and read accounts from people you've helped serve across the region.

At IRUSA, we work hard to empower communities, especially for those that are often overlooked. There are over 33 million disabled people across Eastern Europe, and many parts of the region do not have the medical infrastructures to support them. IRUSA is committed to building these infrastructures.

HEALTH



Sueda's Story Albania

Sueda is a healthcare professional working in a district that provides healthcare services for thousands of people. The population is in great need of support of additional medical staff to carry out medical visits for patients in remote areas.

Thanks to IRUSA, the district has been equipped with mobile medical vehicles to carry out medical visits at the homes of residents in remote areas, a significant number of medical supplies and emergency drugs, and medical bags.

Now, Sueda is able to provide medical care to those in remote parts of the district.

Thanks to IRUSA, the healthcare system is now thriving.

We are grateful for [IRUSA]. It is such a good opportunity that together we will undertake such a major initiative, knowing that the health and well-being of our people for us are primary."

FOOD SECURITY

In Europe and Central Asia, 111.1 million people are considered food insecure, and 25 million people cannot maintain healthy diets. When someone is severely food insecure, they have gone a day or more without eating.

IRUSA's largest humanitarian sector is food aid, and we are working hard to transform agrifood systems around the world to adequately address food insecurity.

Besnik's Story





Besnik is father who cares for his family of six through social assistance. He is unable to work due to poor economic conditions, and relies on the generosity of IRUSA donors for food. He is a regular recipient of fresh fruits and vegetables, and also receives seasonal items such as food boxes and Ourbani meat.

Through the Long-term Path to Agriculture Development project, Besnik received 37 chickens and three turkeys. Besnik hopes to create sustainable income and financial stability by selling them.

Besnik and his family are happier than ever, and wholeheartedly thank you all for your contributions and continuous support.

WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE (WASH)



One of the United Nations six target goals for North Macedonia is to achieve access to adequate and equitable sanitation and hygiene for all, and end open defecation, paying special attention to the needs of women and girls by 2030. As of 2024, 88% of North Macedonians lack safely managed sanitation services.

At IRUSA, we are committed to improving the lives of those in North Macedonia by providing the equipment needed for sanitation services through our Integrated Approach Towards Sustainable Development project.

Ridvan's story

North Macedonia

In a municipality in North Macedonia, Ridvan Ibrahimi is the mayor who is actively trying to improve the living conditions of the people in the region. Proper waste management services were not implemented because the municipality did not have the resources.

IRUSA provided several large bin lorries (garbage trucks) as well as excavators to help clean up the region and provide ongoing sanitation services. Prior, the entire region relied on one small lorry that did not always function properly.

Thanks to your donations, Ridvan states that waste is being collected more efficiently, and the municipality is cleaner.

OUR WORK ACROSS THE MIDDLE EAST AND NORTH AFRICA

IRUSA has had a presence in the Middle East since 1997. Not only have we been able to provide immediate and long-term aid to those in desperate need, but we've also helped bring compassion, comfort, and hope back into the hearts of families across the region. Now, over 30 years later, IRUSA continues to deliver life-saving aid across nine Middle Eastern and North African countries including Irag, Jordan, Lebanon, Libya, Morocco, Palestine, Syria, Türkiye, and Yemen.

In 2024, IRUSA donors helped support projects in the Middle East through projects like food security in Yemen; emergency water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) projects in Lebanon and Palestine; and Ramadan food boxes in Morocco.

Take a look at some of our work and read from the people you've helped serve across the region.



There are over 61 million children living in countries affected by political instability in the Middle East out of a total population of nearly 166 million. That means for one in every third child, violence has become the new normal.

For years now, experts have warned against the unprecedented levels of psychological trauma present in the Palestinian population, specifically children. Now, more than ever, it's become increasingly important to provide as much relief as we can in their great time of need. Thanks to your support, we're able to help make this possible.

Rahaf's Story Palestine

Rahaf is a young girl, living in a camp in Deir al-Balah, Gaza. Her experience is like that of any child living through violence. In the first few days, she shared she's never felt fear or panic like this before. Her and her siblings clung by their parents' side as they listened to the sound of missiles. Fire from one of the missiles even managed to creep its way into their home. The family was eventually forced to flee to Rafah.



Thanks to donors like you, Rahaf was able to find healing through joining a mind-body skills group.

I found comfort."

Eventually, she learned new ways to cope with her trauma and was even able to do things on her own, without feeling the need to cling to her mother.

HEALTH

The attack on the health system in Palestine has been particularly devastating - less than half of Gaza's hospitals are partially functional, facing challenges with the shortage of medical staff and lack of essential medical supplies. Experts have shared that more people will die of disease if we're not able to put the health system back together and provide people with the basics of life. Thanks to you, we've been able to work with local partners to provide proper healthcare to our brothers and sisters in need.



Dalia's Story Palestine

Dalia* is a woman currently pregnant with her fourth child. In her previous pregnancies, Dalia never took prenatal vitamins or supplements due to cost. However, during this pregnancy, Dalia has experienced muscle and joint pain, exhaustion, hair loss and nail breakage, weakness in appetite, and other symptoms that have interfered with her day-to-day activities.

Donors like you helped make it possible for Dalia to receive critical supplements, free of charge. After she started taking the prenatal vitamins regularly, she felt a significant improvement in her health.

My hair has become healthier, and I'm able to fulfill my responsibilities as a mother with more energy. My appetite has [also] improved and my blood test results are excellent compared to the beginning of the pregnancy," Dalia shared.

LIVELIHOOD

Refugees in Jordan lack access to adequate and consistent work, making it difficult for them to support their families. Thanks to your support, IRUSA worked to promote the economic empowerment and social inclusion of vulnerable refugees through increased access to livelihood opportunities including professional development services, entrepreneurial training, and financial assistance.



Fawzia's Story **9** Jordan

Fawzia is an Iragi refugee living in Jordan with her five children. Her and her family share a humble. one-bedroom home, and due to their status as refugees, she and her elder son are unable to find work. Her main source of income is humanitarian aid. To make matters worse, she suffers from both back pain and a leg injury but is unable to afford proper healthcare.

When asked about benefiting from IRUSA's Economic Empowerment and Social Inclusion of Vulnerable Refugees project, she shared,

EMERGENCIES

Decades of political instability have destroyed the communities that once thrived in the Middle East. Millions of people have been displaced from their homes and are in need of humanitarian assistance, women and children among those most affected. Three of the nine countries IRUSA works in - Palestine, Syria, and Yemen - have suffered greatly and are among the poorest nations in the region. With your support, we're helping to rebuild the Middle East and North Africa.

EMERGENCY RELIEF FOR PALESTINE AND SYRIA



📍 Palestine

The ongoing escalation of violence in Palestine has killed at least 45,000, with some reports estimating the numbers are in the hundreds of thousands, including men, women, and children, with thousands more deemed injured or missing.

IRUSA has been working with our partners on the ground, some of which have been in Palestine for decades, to redirect all funds to fully support our ongoing emergency efforts. While issues related to the delivery of humanitarian aid persist, IRUSA has successfully distributed food, water, medicine and medical supplies, winter aid, and other necessities.

In response to the United Nations officials warnings of impending famine, IRUSA has distributed food aid, including fresh food parcels and hot meals, to over 700,000 internally displaced people.

When Gaza still had partially functioning hospitals, IRUSA helped ease their challenges by providing medical supplies to three hospitals, and providing access to mobile clinics and other medical care for nearly 500,000 people.

On top of everything else, we're working with an organization focused on mental health to provide immediate trauma response for over 100,000 people. We've also been able to distribute essential non-food items including bedding and winter clothing to more than 39,000 people.

IRUSA strongly supports a ceasefire and the establishment of a permanent humanitarian corridor, which would allow the safe transit of humanitarian aid.

Svria

December 8 marked the fall of the Assad regime, further exasperating the decadelong humanitarian crisis in Syria. IRUSA is responding by providing cash assistance and basic winter needs to mitigate the effects of weather conditions on conflict-affected people in northwest Syria. IRUSA also implemented a comprehensive sponsorship program that includes monthly sponsorship, healthcare check-ups, psychosocial support (PSS) activities, livelihood support for caregivers, and educational support activities.





EDUCATION

One in five adults around the world have not received any formal education, and in the Middle East, North Africa, and sub-saharan Africa, nearly 41% of the adults have not completed even one year of school. The number of uneducated women is nearly double that of men.

IRUSA assists children in going back to school through various projects such as the Assisting Out of School Girls Access to Education in Afghanistan projects and educational scholarships. They also help adults gain the knowledge they need for employment through vocational training such as bookkeeping training, tailoring training, and more.

Ali is a father of 11 children and a farmer of plants and vegetables including tomato, onion, lettuce, lemon, dates, and guava.

Ali recalls his years as a teenager, when his family raised livestock. "When I was a teenager we were pure nomads with more than 80 camels and 700 sheep and goats and the situation of the country was good at that time. There was no fear of hunger and displacement and life was forging ahead happily."

Due to recurrent droughts in Somalia caused by climate change, Ali lost most of his livestock and finally decided to try his hand at agricultural farming on his family's land. Access to water for irrigation has been a primary concern for Ali, and output has been low.

Thanks to your donations, a drip irrigation system was installed on Ali's land and a shallow well on his land was rehabilitated. Now, Ali is



able to access water for irrigation easily. He also received training on agricultural practices and output.

"Now water is available to me and with the skills and knowledge I got from the training, I am confident that this time my crop yield will be much higher than before."



Hamnah's unwavering faith supports her as she struggles with her heart condition, which causes only half of her heart to work. She told us, "I get my strength from Allah (SWT), when your relationship with Allah is strong, Allah (SWT) is your strength."

The number of people forced to flee their homes has almost doubled in the past decade, with at least 120 million people worldwide now forcibly displaced.

More than 40% of displaced people are children. IRUSA works around the world to help refugees and internally displaced people, such as Syrian refugees in Türkiye, Sudanese refugees in Chad, and Haitian refugees in Mexico, settle in their host countries. We also are helping nearly 1,052 refugees in the US.

MAKENDY'S STORY



Makendy and Lourdes fled Haiti due to a dire humanitarian situation caused by gang violence, insecurity, and lack of access to basic services. Through the support of Islamic Relief USA, they were able to take part in the Mexico Local Integration Program. The program supported refugee and asylum seeking families through livelihood support activities to rebuild their futures in Mexico.

Through the program, their family was relocated where they both found permanent employment at a company that manufactures automotive parts. They are even able to work different schedules so that they can take turns caring for their son.

"The day they called me to let me know that I had been hired at Exedy was a great happiness for me," says Makendy.

While they have had the chance to rebuild their lives, their dream is to reunite with their family. "If I can bring my children back from Haiti, I will buy a house and a car here in Mexico. I want to live here."

Access to clean water is not just a matter of convenience, it's a fundamental human right.

As of 2024, 2.2 billion people globally do not have access to clean, safe drinking water. Instead of turning on their faucets or flushing their toilets like we do, they source their water from scarce and contaminated water sources, leading to 3.4 million deaths each year. At IRUSA, our water projects around the world focus on improving access to clean water sources, and reducing the impact of water-related disease through water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) measures.

GHULAM'S STORY Pakistan



A farmer in Pakistan, Ghulam cares for his 12 family members on the little money he makes due to the poor farming conditions in his village. The sandy soils have restricted the farmland's capacity for natural production because it does not retain water well.

Ghulam was selected to have a water storage facility built on his farmland to help irrigate and drain the land through IRUSA's Action for Drought Adaptive Practices and Transformation (ADAPT) project. This will prevent water wastage and have an immense effect on crop production.

Thanks to your generous donations, Ghulam says that IRUSA has allowed "a new phase of life."



Thanks to IRUSA donors, Shazia is able to run a successful business. Read her story:

SHAZIA'S STORY • Afghanistan



Having lost everything to a house fire, Shazia and her family were forced to settle in a one-room mud house. Shazia is the family's sole breadwinner, with her husband currently unemployed and finding it difficult to find work.

"The fire had taken away everything we owned, leaving us worried about our future. Both my husband and I were unemployed, which made it difficult to get through each day and night. The rent for the house was a constant struggle, and we couldn't afford enough food."

Shazia started a small business that was generating around \$28 a month. Through IRUSA, Shazia participated in an eight-day small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) training course and after completing the training, received a financial grant of 60,000 Afs (approx. \$850) to expand and sustain her business. Now, Shazia's business generates \$84 a month.

"I have assumed the role of supporting my family's needs by working hard. Thanks to the income I have generated, I was able to invest and purchase 10 chickens, enabling me to sell their eggs and generate additional income."

faith-Based Giving

In Islam, it is highly encouraged for Muslims to give charity to those in need, especially during Ramadan. It is also mandatory to give charity - Qurbani and Zakat - for some Muslims during certain times of the year. Qurbani, or Udhiyah, commemorates Prophet Ibrahim's [AS] willingness to sacrifice his son, Prophet Ismail [AS]. On this day, which falls on the 10th day of Dhu al-Hijjah, Muslims sacrifice an animal. The meat is then distributed to family, friends, and those in need, which is an effective way to address food insecurity. Zakat, or almsgiving, is one of the five pillars of Islam, and is mandatory for every sane, adult Muslim who owns wealth over a certain amount. He or she must pay 2.5% of that wealth as Zakat to those in need.

When you give your faith-based charity through IRUSA, it's powerful, impactful, and its potential grows by multiples. Take a look at some of those you have helped through faith-based charity.

ZAKAT ZAINAB'S STORY

Mali

Zainab is the sole provider for her five children, and works as a house help for minimal money. "Life is very hard now. The cost of living is guite high. I earn very little and often the wages are delayed. I am forced to live off debts to ensure I take care of my children," she shared.

Thanks to IRUSA donors like you, Zainab was able to receive food that helped her feed her family. "There was excitement since we received the token vouchers the day before [the] distribution."

The family received enough food to feed her family for 15 days. "We were surprised by the amount of food we have all received. We have received a lot of food. We are grateful to Allah (SWT) for providing us with food."

On September 8, 2023, a 6.8-magnitude earthquake struck Morocco, killing more than 2,900. **IRUSA launched** an emergency response in Morocco, working with local partners on the ground to provide emergency relief including food, non-food items, and emergency shelter.

On October 7, 2023, violence escalated between Israel and Palestine, and the death toll has risen to an extremely high number amid Israel's continued bombardment of the besieged enclave. IRUSA has committed over \$29.4 million dollars through twelve partner organizations working in Gaza to provide emergency relief and humanitarian aid in Palestine including Ramadan food distributions, medical care, winter aid, improved access to water, psychological support, and much more. IRUSA has provided support to over 106,236 households to date.

On May 10, flash floods caused by heavy rains devastated villages in northern Afghanistan, killing 315 people and injuring more than 1,600. IRUSA launched an emergency campaign and distributed multi-purpose cash assistance [MPCA], food items, and non-food items to the most vulnerable flood-affected people.

On April 29, the Old Kijabe dam burst due to torrential rainfall. IRUSA responded by supporting the provision of cash transfers and strategic borehole rehabilitations in four counties of Kenya. We reached 2,800 families in Tana River County, 700 families in Garissa County, and 2,776 families in Mandera and Wajira counties.

IRUSA launched an emergency response in Bangladesh to distribute multi-purpose cash assistance to flood-affected communities to purchase food, water, medicine, and other essential items.

On July 8, Hurricane Beryl made landfall on the Gulf Coast of Texas as a Category 1 storm. IRUSA launched an emergency response and provided 500 flood buckets, a truck filled with pallets of water, and hot meals for 10,000 people.

Severe storms on May 16 left eight people dead in Houston HOUSTON following severe weather that affected the city. DMT deployed a group of volunteers to assess the damage and support those affected.

Hurricane Milton made landfall on October 9 on Florida's Gulf Coast as a Category 3 storm. IRUSA's DMT deployed a group of volunteers FLORIDA to assist in the muck and gut work for homes damaged by the hurricane.

Hurricane Helene made landfall on September 26, on Florida's
Gulf Coast, as a powerful Category

On September 23, Israel launched intense air strikes across areas of Lebanon, marking the deadliest day of Israeli strikes in Lebanon since the 2006 war. IRUSA launched an emergency response and provided immediate emergency assistance including food aid, essential non-food items, and access to proper healthcare to families in desperate need.

When the Assad regime fell on December 8, IRUSA responded by providing emergency relief to conflictaffected people in northwestern Syria. IRUSA provided cash assistance,

winter aid, and implemented a comprehensive orphan sponsorship program.

Colombia was impacted with widespread flooding, landslides, and infrastructure damage causing the government of Colombia to Declare a State of Emergency. IRUSA's DMT deployed a group of volunteers to conduct a needs assessment and provide life-saving food aid.

On April 15, 2023, armed clashes erupted between armed groups in multiple cities across Sudan. IRUSA launched an emergency response in Sudan to support those affected by violence across the country.



IRUSA was one of the first organizations to call for a Gaza ceasefire? Our Advocates met with representatives and held coalition meetings with partners and IRUSAdvocates on Hill Days.







Participate for Impact is a pilot event that brings together the Volunteer Management Office, US Programs, Public Affairs, Research, and Advocacy (PARA), and Fundraising departments of Islamic Relief USA. At our first event in California, we had over 80 volunteers that came to pack a meal, get advocacy training, and stayed for a fundraising dinner. Our second event was in Dallas, TX, on September 14, and there we packed meals that were distributed at Maarouf, an IRUSA refugee resettlement partner. In both events, attendees were given the opportunity to learn about domestic policies that impact the communities that they care about. We discussed the Farm Bill, Child Tax Credit, and the Afghan Adjustment Act.

We want our supporters to know that there are many ways to support IRUSA, not just with donations, but with advocacy and volunteering as well.

CAMPUS ENGAGEMENT

At Duke University in January, we joined with chaplains from universities across the US to address the challenges facing students due to the rise of Islamophobia and antisemitism increasing since October of 2023. In addition, we host universities such as Boston College, who visited our headquarters again this summer with their newest cohort of social work graduate students, to present to them on our United States Refugees Admissions Program and refugee work and to exchange ideas on how we can partner to address the most pressing human needs and issues today and tomorrow – preparing for the future.

This fall, there was an unprecedented convergence in New York of the UN Summit of the Future, UN Climate Week, and the UN General Assembly (UNGA) all of which Islamic Relief USA took part in. CEO, Ahmed Shehata also took part in the Clinton Global Initiative, which took advantage of the many heads of state in town to convene. One of the notable achievements of the week was the highlighting of our new partnership with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). The CEO office and PARA team took part in organizing two panels - one on Islamic Philanthropy, where a formal Memorandum of Understanding was signed, and another around refugees and welcoming the stranger from a multifaith lens. IRUSA staff attended various other events around Gaza, vulnerable children out of school around the globe, and Christina Tobias-Nahi, our PARA Director, was invited to an intimate gathering with the CEO of Chobani to taste test some new products like a strong fortified nonperishable milk that could be used to feed hungry people in precarious situations such as displacement.

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) have, for the past decade, provided a new approach for uplifting people among International non-governmental organizations (INGOs) such as IRUSA, and a framework around which to mobilize. Research points out that, "expectations from non-governmental organization leaders are higher than from others. They must combine ethical and technical competence to achieve sustainable development goals. INGOs support international development, direct aid effort, promote their own specific causes, and influence public policies."

As we approach the final decade for implementation of Agenda 2030, INGOs such as IRUSA as providing visible and credible information and explanations about the need to accomplish the SDGs, and they are helping to mobilize for policy changes that will narrow the wide gap that still exists between the aspiration of the goals and their actual execution - the reality is we are falling short in almost all countries, including the US.

It should come as no surprise then that religious communities and global leaders

across the world share a priority focus on finding solutions. Brazil, which held the G20 presidency in 2024, hosted in August the G20 Interfaith Forum, representing a diverse network of religiously inspired networks and other stakeholders, CEO, Ahmed Shehata and Director of Public Affairs, Research, and Advocacy, Christina Tobias-Nahi, each spoke on panels around global health and our US refugee work respectively as we continue to showcase our thought leadership on international platforms. They also visited the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees Brasilia office to learn more about the local situation there, and how IRUSA can be a resource to the still arriving Afghan population. It was a very fruitful gathering and stressed the urgency of action for people and the planet given the polycrisis before us. We look forward to participation in South Africa which will hold the G20 presidency in 2025, and invite you to reach out to learn more and get involved.



WHAT IS A POLYCRISIS?

The term polycrisis describes a complex situation where multiple, interconnected crises converge and amplify each other, resulting in systemic challenges that are difficult to manage. Unlike single crises, which may have clear causes and solutions, a polycrisis involves overlapping and interdependent issues. This concept reflects growing concerns about the sustainability and viability of contemporary socio-economic, political, and ecological systems. The concept was coined in the 1990s but has reemerged recently to refer to the combined effects for example of the COVID-19 pandemic, war, surging country debt levels, inflation, climate change, resource depletion, and growing inequality around the globe.

Assalaamu Alaikum. Peace Be Upon You.



My first year as chairman of the IRUSA Board of Directors was met with unprecedented violence in places like Gaza, Sudan, and Lebanon, and climate-induced disasters in places like Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Kenya, Florida, and Texas. And yet, through it all, IRUSA volunteers, partners, and donors answered our call time and time again to serve those in need.

In 2024 alone, you helped deliver aid to more than 8,734,405 people across more than 40 countries. Thanks to you, IRUSA was able to provide emergency relief, including food aid, cash assistance, medical care, winter aid, improved access to water, and psychological support to more than

106,236 Palestinian households in Gaza. We also provided emergency relief to flood-affected communities in Bangladesh, Kenya, Florida, and Texas, such as cash grants for food, water, temporary shelter, and medicine. We were also able to sponsor more than 26,854 orphans and children in need, provide winter aid kits to 68,507 people in need, and much more.

We know that none of this would have been possible without your support. My first year as chairman has taught me that there is unity among us – our donors, volunteers, staff, and partners – and together, we can see a world free of poverty. I am honored to have been on this journey with you all for the past year, and I am dedicated to continue providing effective and efficient support to families in need both here at home and around the world.
